Supporting community mobility across the life span

Being able to move around freely and easily in one's community has a significant influence on a person's ability to choose, organize and satisfactorily perform a wide range of meaningful occupations across the life span. Regardless of age, gender, nature or extent of disability, geographical location, or other social and cultural factors, community mobility plays an integral role in facilitating opportunities for participation.

The purposes of this special issue are to:

1. Provide a broad perspective on community mobility and its influence on occupation and participation across the life span, and
2. Offer evidence to guide occupational therapy practices that support clients' community mobility (individuals, families, communities).

To achieve these goals, the following types of papers are of particular interest for this special issue:

- Descriptive studies addressing community mobility issues and their impact on occupation and participation,
- Outcome studies evaluating interventions to improve community mobility of clients and/or in communities, and
- Policy analyses of issues influencing community mobility (e.g., older adult driving, accessible public transportation).

Case reports, psychometric studies, program descriptions and other types of articles addressing community mobility are also welcome.
