

## Support Access to OT for Mental Health Services under Medicare

**Note:** Begin by sharing why occupational therapy is a valuable service for individuals with mental health or substance use disorders. If you have experience working with clients in behavioral health settings, consider sharing one personal or clinical example.

## **Key Point**

- Occupational therapy supports individuals with mental health and substance use disorders by helping them manage daily routines, improve cognitive functioning, and maintain independence. These are essential skills for avoiding crises and staying engaged in community life.
- Despite the field beginning in mental health, OT is now underrepresented in mental health settings—mostly due to outdated reimbursement structures and a lack of awareness.
- Medicare Part B already covers OT services for someone with a psychiatric diagnosis, including in Partial Hospitalization Programs (PHPs) and Intensive Outpatient Programs (IOPs).
- Confusion around billing practices contributes to underutilization. OT practitioners bill for their services using standard OT billing codes—not mental health-specific ones—which can lead to misunderstandings about when OT services are covered.
- Raising awareness about OT's role can help address provider shortages. When people
  understand what services OT can provide, it can ease mental health providers shortages and make
  sure people have access to the services they need.

## The Bill: H.R. 4037, the Occupational Therapy Mental Health Parity Act

- H.R. 4037 directs the Secretary of Health and Human Services to conduct outreach and provide education to clarify that OT services are covered for individuals with mental health and substance use disorders under Medicare.
- It does not create a new benefit or expand scope of practice. It simply ensures that existing coverage is better understood and utilized.
- The bill is modeled on a successful 2001 Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) clarification for dementia care, which significantly improved access to OT services.
- Last year, this bill passed as part of a larger bill in the Senate Finance Committee. As part of that
  process, the Congressional Budget Office (CBO) scored this bill as "no cost" because it does not
  add a new benefit.
