### Online Education Modules on Driving and Community Mobility


The Education Modules, *AOTA OT's Role in Addressing Driving & Community Mobility*, were developed as a resource for faculty for student education. They were developed as a project of the AOTA Older Driver Initiative funded by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) and are available free of charge for use without restriction. Dr. Jennifer Radloff, OTD, OTR/L, CDRS, who is both a faculty member and a driving rehabilitation specialist, was contracted to author these modules to support occupational therapy (OT) faculty.




### Supporting materials for invited guest speakers for academic programs, occupational therapy state conferences, or other venues.

To improve the consistency and scope of education provided by guest speakers on the topic of driving and community mobility, a speaker's toolkit was developed as a project of the American Occupational Therapy Association (AOTA) Older Driver Initiative, with funding support from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA). These resources were developed by experts in driving rehabilitation who were members of both AOTA and the Association for Driver Rehabilitation Specialists (ADED).

The speaker's toolkit encourages a joint presentation representing the role of the occupational therapy practitioner who addresses driving risk, and a specialist in driving rehabilitation who would be prepared to delve more deeply into this specialized field and associated resources. This speaker's toolkit is available to members and nonmembers and is available for use without charge. An application process is involved to allow the core team to provide the needed support an individual speaker may require to develop a presentation.






### CarFit


CarFit is a community-based education program developed as a collaborative project between AOTA, AARP, and AAA. The program provides occupational therapy practitioners and students the opportunity to interact with community partners and driving seniors in community. The focus of CarFit is not on behavior (aka the ability to drive safely) but on the specific person-vehicle fit. All occupational therapy providers and students are welcome to participate after completing the training provided by the CarFit program. There are multiple levels of participation available, beginning with the technician level where the occupational therapy volunteers to complete the 12-point safety checklist under the supervision of a trained CarFit Event Coordinator. The levels progress with training provided for each, from CarFit 1:1, to Event Coordinator to CarFit Instructor.

CarFit should not be confused with driving rehabilitation. CarFit offers an entry point to interaction with seniors in the community, the meaningful role of education and prevention, and the introduction of low-tech solutions (not involving a moving vehicle). The distinction between providers is described in the following diagram and is explained in detail in the CarFit OT Module available through the CarFit program. The diagram below describes an occupational therapy process of exploration of a better person-vehicle fit. The first step is always to optimize the person's position and capabilities, whether it is an assessment for a rocker knife in the kitchen, a grab bar in the bathroom, or an adaptive device to assist with entering and exiting the vehicle. The following progression is used in the CarFit education as a guide for all occupational therapy practitioners. The information below is described in detail as a part of the OT CarFit Training.

### What's YOUR Solution? Occupational therapy can help!

### Cannot Clearly See the Road

OT can...

- Check seat height and position, adjust as needed (hips centered and fully back in seat)
- Review seat cushion options

### **Discomfort Managing Pedals**

OT can...

- Recommend shoe styles that allow for better feel of pedals.
- Educate on the pros and cons of using a firm cushion behind the back.

OT Specialist can...

- Educate on equipment solutions.
- Explore driving using hands in cases of amputation or poor sensation.

### Hip or Back Pain

OT can...

- Educate on seat-base height adjustment.
- Explore modified positions of hips, knees, and feet.

### Pain When Twisting to Reach Seatbelt

OT can...

- Suggest a simple ribbon or seatbelt pull.
- Educate on therapy options to address the underlying source of pain.

OT Specialist can...

 Explore equipment solutions (e.g., modify seat or reposition control moving it within pain-free reach)

### Reaching and Turning Steering Wheel Hurts

OT Specialist can...

 Recommend changes to the location or design of vehicle controls, so reaching, pulling, and turning are more comfortable.

### **CAUTION!**

Consider pros and cons with any changes to original vehicle equipment.











Several partners in senior safe mobility have developed talking points and resources to consider integrating into an individual education session with patients, with families, or as a part of a broader community presentation.
